President's Letter

Dear Friends of LifeSpring,

Once again it is my honor and privilege to welcome you to LifeSpring Health Systems' Annual Report. I am proud to report that 2019 was another stellar year of growth and consolidation of the many strides forward made by the merger of LifeSpring with Southern Hills Counseling Center in 2018. The addition of new programs and new capabilities was a hallmark of this year. The Southern Hills operations, now assimilated into the organization as LifeSpring's Western Division, were fully integrated into the Centricity Electronic Medical Records platform and the LifeSpring network. Our Integrated Treatment Center successfully implemented an Intensive Outpatient Program under the new Medicaid standards. The Turning Point Center, our subacute substance treatment program, established a walk-in admission system eliminating the traditional waitlist.

In accordance with our strategic plan, LifeSpring successfully implemented an innovative Medication Assisted Treatment Emergency Department follow-up program under a state grant. This program provided access to peer support specialists to patients who were inducted into Medication Assisted Treatment in a local hospital Emergency Department. LifeSpring also collaborated with the City of Jeffersonville to establish a presence at the Spring Hill EnVision Center to connect clients in the community with resources and to reduce the stigma about accessing addiction services and participating in recovery.

This year, staff development was an emphasis as LifeSpring staff were trained in the Seven Challenges approach to adolescent substance abuse, the STAR approach for working with military members and families, and the BRITE trauma treatment method. In addition, our Wellness Workgroup developed and sent daily messages of hope, support and wellness to all staff to be continued on an ongoing basis.

Building on our strong forensic program, services to inmates were established or continued in the Scott County, Clark County, Dubois County and Crawford County Jails. LifeSpring also expanded services in the Spencer County Jail to include assessments, group and individual therapy. Furthermore, LifeSpring assisted Perry County Probation in establishing a Perry County Dual-Status Team. In Crawford County, LifeSpring developed and implemented a Treatment Team Court composed of the Judge, Sheriff, Probation department, Prosecutor's office, Defense Attorneys, Hoosier Hills PACT and LifeSpring Health Systems staff. In October of 2019, Adult Behavioral Services at the Lindley Building in Jeffersonville formally became a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) site. Soon after, the Children and Family Services program also became an FQHC site. The Dubois County office implemented a 12-step Dialectical Behavior Therapy program and in October, we opened a Genoa pharmacy on site for the benefit of our clients. In Orange County, the center partnered with the Indiana University School of Public Health and the Center for Rural Engagement to develop a local Community Health Improvement Plan.

Throughout 2019, the center renovated a new 14,000 square foot multi-service center facility in Austin, Indiana that will provide primary care, addiction treatment and mental health services as well as providing space for the Scott County Health department. We also established a mobile clinic as a service site in Jeffersonville which initially provided healthcare for the homeless and later triaged COVID-19 patients. Our primary care program staff also provided testimony at hearings led by the Indiana state legislature for a law that would allow for overdose and fatality reviews at the local level through the state. Staff and program leadership also made a presentation at the prestigious National Academy of Science, Engineering and Medicine in regard to the integration of infectious disease care, substance abuse treatment, and primary care. The center also developed a multidisciplinary Rural Healthcare Workgroup to begin to address treatment barriers and disparities in rural areas.

Overall, the LifeSpring community health program served 7,243 patients this year which was an increase of 63% over the prior year. The program also significantly expanded its 340b program making low cost medications more readily available to a wide range of LifeSpring clients. The year ended with LifeSpring developing plans to address the COVID-19 issue as a safety net public health resource for our service area. As you can see, 2019 was a very busy and productive year due to our many clients, supporters, Foundation members, board members and staff. Thank you for everything that you do.

LifeSpring continues to grow, adapt and respond to our community's healthcare needs, and we are proud that we were able to expand our capacity to serve more individuals in 2019. Since the merger with Southern Hills Counseling Center, LifeSpring has created new initiatives and programs to encompass a growing service area. For example, both LifeSpring's Adult Behavioral Services and Children and Family Services in Jeffersonville became officially designated Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) sites. Additionally, we established an FQHC with our mobile unit that is located at the Integrated Treatment Center. The mobile unit has the capability of being utilized for emergencies and traveling to our more rural areas where access to healthcare is more limited. These FQHC sites have allowed us to expand medical services to the most vulnerable in our communities.

LifeSpring Successes



EnVision Center

The EnVision Center in Jeffersonville was opened in 2019 by the Jeffersonville Housing Authority. The Center is a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) program spearheaded by the Jeffersonville Housing Authority. Throughout the two-year development, the City of Jeffersonville and the Jeffersonville Housing Authority built partnerships between local government agencies, non-profits, such as LifeSpring Health Systems, a local bank, and colleges to improve the former Boys and Girls' Club building in the Claysburg neighborhood. The goal of the EnVision Center is to operate as a centralized hub that provides community members of all ages with resources and support needed to excel. The core of the EnVision Center program is focused on four pillars of excellence: Economic Empowerment, Educational Advancement, Health and Wellness, and Character and Leadership. LifeSpring peer recovery coaches are on-site to promote the behavioral, primary care, and addiction services we offer by providing individuals with support, life skills development, access to local resources and treatment. Finally, the center also hosted monthly healthy living classes for the community.

Hispanic Heritage Month Community Fair

LifeSpring was proud to partner with our community to host this past year's Community Health Fair during Hispanic Heritage Month. LifeSpring has organized the annual fair for the last three years to celebrate National Hispanic Heritage Month, and provide needed health and human service resources and outreach to those in the Hispanic community. In 2019, around 180 people attended our fair at Clarksville Middle School where 20 vendors gave out resources, provided kids' activities and awarded door prizes. Many families who attend the fair face linguistic and transportation barriers that often prevent them from accessing beneficial information from local agencies, particularly health care. Malinda Mackenzie, Community



Outreach Coordinator, explains the goal of the fair is to "provide as many community resources to families as possible as to provide a safe environment to address any concerns the families may have". Interpreters were available on site to provide culturally competent and informed interpretation. Vendors included representatives from the Jeffersonville Library, Centerstone, New Hope Services, Family and Children's Place, Kanti Wellness, and more.

LifeSpring's Mobile Health Services

Through a grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration, LifeSpring was able to purchase a mobile health unit. This unit features two exam rooms, hot and cold water, a separate bathroom, and plenty of space to triage and register patients.

"We had borrowed a mobile health unit from the Clark County Health Department on several occasions, and this allowed us to really figure out what we needed for our own unit," said Beth Keeney, Senior Vice President of Community Health Services. She continued, "Once the funding opportunity came along, we moved quickly."




The timing couldn't have been more perfect. The mobile unit was in place just as COVID-19 began, and has allowed patients displaying any type of symptoms to remain outside of LifeSpring's largest health center in Jeffersonville. A local business, S&K Signs and Banners, even worked over several weekends to complete the artwork on the unit, ensuring it was still operational during the week.

"Having the mobile unit in place during the height of the pandemic allowed us to ensure our patients and staff were safe. We were able to properly assess, test, and treat some of the most vulnerable in our community without placing anyone else at risk," said Amanda Davis-Houchen, Clinical Director of Community Health.



Demographics of Behavioral Health




Primary Mental Health Diagnosis
